Recovery and Recovery Support Services

The process of recovery is unique to each individual and can take different paths. It can involve clinical treatment, medications, faith-based approaches, peer and family support, self-care, and other methods. Recovery is characterized by continuous growth and improvement in health and well-being. Since recovery is highly personalized, the services and support offered must be suitable for different age groups and adaptable to ensure cultural relevance. Recovery support services are based in the community and occur across the lifespan of the individual. These services address an individual's environment and provide emotional and practical support to sustain recovery. Recovery is defined as a process of change through which individuals improve their health and wellness, live self-directed lives, and strive to reach their full potential (SAMHSA, 2010). This definition does not describe recovery as a single point in time, but rather as an ongoing process. SAMHSA has identified four dimensions that support a life in recovery. Below are these dimensions outlining allowable costs for recovery support services:

The Four Major Dimensions of Recovery

- **Health:** Overcoming or managing one's disease(s) or symptoms, and making informed, healthy choices that support physical and emotional well-being;
- Home: Having a stable and safe place to live;
- **Purpose:** Conducting meaningful daily activities, such as a job, school volunteerism, family caretaking, or creative endeavors, and the independence, income, and resources to participate in society;
- Community: Having relationships and social networks that provide support, friendship, love, and hope.

SAMHSA promotes recovery support systems that involve collaboration with individuals in recovery from mental and substance use disorders, as well as their family members. These systems aim to guide the behavioral health system and promote approaches at the individual, program, and system levels that foster health, wellness, and resilience. They also strive to increase supportive housing services, reduce barriers to employment, education, and other life goals, and establish necessary social supports within chosen communities.

Recovery support services are offered in various settings and help individuals enter and navigate care systems, remove obstacles to recovery, stay engaged in the recovery process, and lead fulfilling lives in their chosen communities. These non-clinical services are culturally and linguistically appropriate and assist individuals and families working towards recovery from mental and/or substance use problems. They encompass a wide range of social, legal, and other services that facilitate recovery, wellness, and connection between service providers and other supports known to enhance people's quality of life. Recovery support services can be provided before, during, or after clinical treatment, and may also be available to individuals who are not currently receiving treatment but seek support services. Professionals and peers deliver these services through various community and faith-based groups, treatment providers, schools, and specialized services. The diverse options for service delivery ensure that the life experiences of all individuals are respected and represented. The following are examples of recovery support services that could be covered by block grants (the list is not exhaustive).

Examples of Recovery Support Services That Are Allowable through the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment Substance Use Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery Services Block Grant (SUBG)

The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023 includes language requiring SAMHSA block grant program recipients to report recovery support services delivered. This table identifies allowable services under the SUPTRS Block Grant for recovery support services. It includes several definitions that grantees will need to meet reporting requirements found in the FY 24-25 MHBG/SUBG Application and Reporting Package. Further instructions are found in the application. We look forward to beginning the process of capturing the data to measure the great recovery support service work happening throughout the country.

Recovery support services are integral to the provision of comprehensive and high-quality mental health care. Recovery support services play an important role in assisting individuals with Serious Mental Illness (SMI) or Serious Emotional Disturbance (SED) on their path to recovery. It is imperative for states to actively explore avenues to integrate recovery support services, including those delivered by peers, into their continuum of care. SAMHSA's BG guidelines as demonstrated in the following MHBG table outline allowable recovery support services within the federal statutory and regulatory parameters. This concerted effort ensures that individuals receive holistic care, treatment, recovery, and other support services.
