2A	Total population served up 13,632 (12%) from FY2014. This increase was expected as a ripple effect from Medicaid expansion (ACA).
2B	With increase in total population served, we would expect proportional increases in the ethnicity trends from FY2014; however, this year the number of unavailable (declined) ethnicity responses increased. There has been no shift in data collection methods for our mental health data to speak to this increase.
3	Consistently across other tables, we saw an increase in those served between the ages of 21-64. Again, we attribute this shift to the ACA and its ripple effects.
4 & 4A	There was a 54% increase in persons 'not in labor force'. We attribute this increase to an unprecedented access to insurance for persons 'not in labor force' with ACA. There have not been any unique CO legislation or business shifts to speak to this increase. Overall, CO still has one of the lowest unemployment rates for the state's history, and is one of the strongest urban economies.
5A	As expected following ACA, there was an increase in Medicaid clients and a decrease in non-Medicaid (indigent). This is a two year trend. Due to lack of specificity in our mental health outcomes data collection tool, we do not see real-time Medicaid eligibility for our consumers.
6	For FY2015, there was a decrease in new admissions to the psychiatric hospitals. This speaks to a current capacity cap with our two state mental health institutions. As with other tables, the largest increase was the duplicated admissions in community mental health settings. With our mental health outcomes data tool, we expect to have duplicate records for clients who come in with no insurance and are retroactively eligible for Medicaid.
8	There was a decrease in MHBG expenditures due to staff vacancies in FY 2015 and lower MHBG charges for data and evaluation than in the previous FY.

12	Percentage of persons served by the SMHA for the reporting period have a dual diagnosis of mental illness and substance abuse: while the SMI/SED percent served did not change due to the ACA, we did see a shift in our substance abuse co-morbidity data. Since ACA, CO community mental health centers have focused on implementing integrated care; however, the data collection systems remain bifurcated between mental health and substance use. In order to reduce duplicitous records in integrated settings, agencies will often have one mental health outcomes tool open reporting only mental health considerations, and a simultaneous substance abuse outcomes tool open for substance use treatment considerations. The Office does not have current integrated data collection recommendations; however, CO is currently designing a new integrated data tool to better capture co-occurring/integrated treatment outcomes. This tool is projected to go live in FY2017.
14A	The increase in multi-racial clients with SMI/SED from FY2014-FY2015 follows the overall percent increase in clients served (Table 2A) who reported multi-racial (52% increase from FY2014-FY2015).
15	With the strong economy, the CO housing market is one of the tightest and most costly in the country, especially in urban areas. This market explains the increase in homeless persons from FY2014.
15A	The number of clients with SMI/SED served for FY2015 trends the same as indicated on Table 12. With ACA, we expect to see an increase of unmet need for consumers (those without severe presentations who did not have insurance before ACA), and continue to maintain the same population of clients with SMI/SED.
16 & 17	Our current mental health outcomes data tool does not collect EBP service information. For this data, we have a separate data collection methodology, which has less stringent data validations and data cleaning. Therefore, the EBP tables will allow for missing data which the other tables do not have. These two methodologies make the comparison/validation in the 'missing' categories not appropriate for these tables. With the new integrated data tool, CO is looking to combine these data collection efforts to ensure better data quality in the future.
