Ohio can state with confidence that 2,400 individuals received ACT; however, these data come from manual head counts, not from the billing system. Therefore, age distributions are not available. This means the number of individuals who received ACT (or Supported Employment) where age is unavailable exceeds the total number of adults with SMI where age is not available.
