2A	As expected following the ACA, there was an increase in persons served from FY13 to FY14.
4	In Colorado, unemployment is at its lowest rate since 2008. According to data from Colorado's Department of Labor, jobs increased steadily in FY2014. In addition, the overall number of consumers increased. Both of these factors account for the increase in employed consumers. It is hypothesized that the economy's improvement has decreased the number of those out of the labor force and increased those looking for work, which accounts for the significant decrease in consumers not in the labor force and the increase in those who are unemployed.
5A	As expected following the ACA, there were an increase in Medicaid clients, and a decrease in indigent clients. This year we saw an increase in the both Medicaid and non-Medicaid funding. Our current data system is not sensitive enough to differentiate those persons who flux between billing sources due to eligibility.
6	There was a decrease in the number of duplicated admissions in community programs. After double checking for data/methodology issues, the Office points to the statewide initiative to focus on engaging clients to increase quality of care and prevent re-admissions to explain this decrease.
12	In FY2014, the number of substance abuse diagnoses that included V71.09 (diagnosis deferred) was significantly lower than in FY2013. In FY2014, over 600 had this diagnosis, whereas almost 4,000 did in FY2013. In FY2013, this diagnosis was disproportionately given to youth under 18 years old compared to adults. Given the substantially lower number of this substance abuse diagnosis (probably affected by CCAR training), the percentage of children/adolescents with a co-occurring substance abuse disorder also decreased.
14A	In FY2013, almost 13,000 people did not have available data on their race. This decreased to 9,300 in FY2014, possibly as a result of CCAR training emphasizing the importance of gathering race data. Given that more people had race information available and there were almost 7,000 more consumers with SMI/SED identified, numbers in each racial group increased with the exception of multiracial. Overall, as shown in table 2A, the number of people who chose more than one race significantly declined in FY2014, which is reflected also in the number of consumers with SMI/SED who identified as multiracial.
15	Overall, the total number of consumers was higher in FY2014 than in FY2013. When looking at the overall percentage of consumers who lived in jail/correctional facilities in FY2014, it is 2%, which is the same percentage for FY2013. For those who are homeless, there was a small increase from 4% to 5% in FY2013 to FY2014. The number of people who were reported to live in an institutional setting decreased from FY2013, which may account for an increased number of people in homeless/shelter settings.
16	Supported Employment: three of the 17 community mental health centers in Colorado conduct fidelity monitoring on their Supported Employment Program via the Mental Health Transformation Grant. These three centers include Mental Health Partners, Mental Health Center of Denver, and Jefferson Center for Mental Health. The Dartmouth-developed fidelity protocol for the Individual Placement and Support (IPS) model is used to measure fidelity annually and fidelity scores are submitted to the Colorado Office of Behavioral Health (OBH). OBH conducts the fidelity review. The supported employment program implementation at the three centers is consistent with the SAMHSA EBP Toolkit and staffs are trained in the EBP.
16	Assertive Community Treatment: in FY2014 all 17 community mental health centers in Colorado conducted fidelity monitoring on their Assertive Community Treatment program that is funded through the State General fund. Three of the 17 community mental health centers in Colorado conduct fidelity monitoring on their Assertive Community Treatment Program that is funded through the State General Fund. They use a modified version of the Dartmouth Assertive Community Treatment Scale (DACTS) to measure fidelity and fidelity scores are submitted to the Colorado Office of Behavioral Health (OBH) annually. The ACT program implementation is consistent (with limited Colorado-specific variations in the fidelity protocol) with the SAMHSA EBP Toolkit and staff are trained in the EBP.
16	With more consumers this year than in FY2013, increased funding sources for EBPs, and a significant ACT expansion, the numbers of consumers increased across the services in this table.
17	The number of consumers receiving Family Psychoeducational services has been decreasing for the past two fiscal years. Last year, it was thought to be a data reporting issue. However, the numbers continue to decline. It is hypothesized that agencies are not using this EBP as frequently or have made significant amendments to it and do not report it due to lack of fidelity. It also may be that they are reporting it as "other." Training continues to be a significant need with this EBP. For the increases in Integrated Dual Diagnoses and Medication Management, that is accounted for by the increase in consumers and the increase in funding sources for EBPs.
19A	There was an increase in response rate from FY2013 (15.7%) to FY2014 (16.5%) on the MHSIP, as well as the YSS-F (FY2013, 12.3%; FY2014, 13.8%). These data also have high missing rates. Over 70% for adults and over 40% for youth.
19B	There was an increase in response rate from FY2013 (12.3%) to FY2014 (13.8%).
