

## 2024 Substance Use Treatment Services State Profile—Idaho National Substance Use and Mental Health Services Survey (N-SUMHSS)

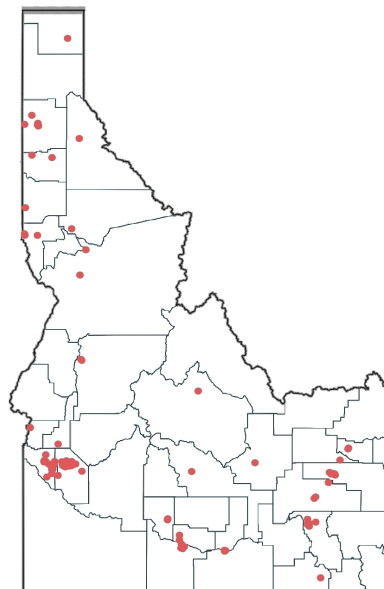

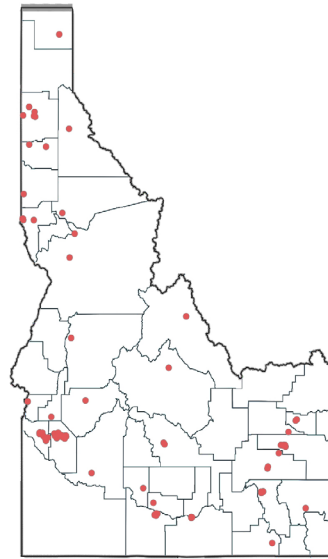
